## President's Corner

Those of you who attended the June meeting may have noticed that I seemed a little out of sorts, the result of my arriving in SFO at 2:00 am that morning from my vacation. The effects of jet lag and lack of sleep from this journey that took me across 10 time zones, were trivial in comparison to the psychological impact that this trip had on me. "Oh no!", you're probably thinking right now, "Not another vacation story!" There is a point to this tale, and it actually relates to what you and I do for a living.

This vacation was not a leisurely visit to some tropical paradise, sipping fruity concoctions beneath the palms while lounging next to sapphire waters. Instead, I traveled to the Baltic Sea and visited a region of the Russian Federation, known as Kaliningrad. This land was part of Germany before WWII, but when the war ended, its 12 million German inhabitants were ousted and replaced with Soviet settlers. I went on this trip to visit my father's birthplace.

I've been to Europe a few times, and although their way of life is noticeably different from ours, the disparity is not so great that it feels "out of the ordinary" for most Americans. In fact, many tourists consider this as part of Europe's "charm". The road that I traveled, however, revealed a world drastically different from what you and I consider normal. So different, in fact, that this journey had a great impact on my psyche.

A bit of historical perspective: during the cold war Kaliningrad, having a huge harbor that didn't freeze over in the winter, provided strategic military value to the Soviet Navy. This value faded away after the collapse of "The Wall", with the result that Moscow's Politicos now provide very little economic or social support. This land is like the "neglected step-child"- unloved, unwanted, but not quite yet discarded. This was evidenced by the very obvious and substantial deterioration of physical infrastructure that is widespread throughout this land. The many young adults hanging out in the parks all day, sharing bottles of vodka, are emblematic of the region's high unemployment rate (~35%). Those who are lucky enough to have a job, barely earn a living wage (the only truly affordable items are vodka and cigarettes!). As a result there is a palpable lack of hope among

the adult population. Most are resigned to the notion that that their lives and living conditions can never, and will never, get better.

This outlook extends to the workplace. Workers here are not likely to set any production records, and farm crops have incredibly low yields. Having a tendency to notice safety conditions wherever I go (it must be a curse among EHS professionals- always “auditing” our surroundings), the ubiquitous lack of safety measures really stood out. I saw no one wearing safety glasses, respirators, or hardhats in conditions that warranted them. Construction workers balanced precariously on walls and roof edges without the benefit of guardrails or “tie offs”. Scaffolding covered the sides of buildings in a Rube Goldberg-like manner, staying connected as if by magic yet appearing on the verge of collapse. Workers navigate these structures without the benefit of safety rails, maneuvering between levels on haphazardly placed ladders. These were just some of the more visible conditions.

This state of affairs that I observed in Russia are in stark contrast to those that we experience here in the USA. Even so, we (I) often complain about our lot and generally take for granted the many material possessions and wonderful experiences that are available to us. This trip was a solid kick in the pants, reminding me how good our life is here. Not only is our standard of living higher than the most of the world’s populace, opportunities to change or improve are also more prevalent.

This experience reawakened my appreciation for my job and career. The work of an EHS professional is very gratifying. It’s not just “a job” that pays the bills, we can actually make a difference, we can have a positive effect on the lives of our coworkers. We are fortunate to have, in our careers, opportunities that few others around the world have, to accomplish wonderful things. That then is the impact of this vacation. I need to ask myself everyday: “am I doing all that I can to make the most of this opportunity?”

## News and Updates

### **Cal/OSHA Appeals Board Fully Staffed with Appointment of New Public Member**

The Department of Industrial Relations’ (DIR) acting director John Rea has announced that Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger has appointed Robert Pacheco, 70, of Walnut, to DIR’s Occupational Safety and Health Appeals Board in the public member seat.

Mr. Pacheco is currently a senior partner with the Law Offices of Pacheco & Pacheco where he has practiced for 30 years on a variety of issues from criminal defense to product liability. He has served as Judge Pro-Tem presiding in the California Superior and Municipal Courts and has extensive civil trial experience. Additionally, he is owner and chief financial officer for Western hardware Company, a manufacturing and import business with sales over \$1 million annually that distributes truck, trailer, and industrial hardware.

Said Rea, “(Mr.) Pacheco’s appointment fully staffs the Cal/OSHA Appeals Board which will enable it to better address the current backlog of cases and more efficiently handle future appeals.”

Pacheco will be performing his Board duties from the West Covina and Sacramento Ca/OSHA Appeals Board offices. Compensation for this position is \$99,693.

The Cal/OSHA Appeals Board is a three-member quasi-judicial body appointed by the governor and confirmed by the Senate. The Board handles appeals from private and public sector employers regarding citations issued by the Division of Occupational Safety and Health for alleged violations of workplace safety and health laws and regulations.

## **Cal/OSHA fines Kern Oil and Refining Company \$83,185 in fatal explosion**

Cal/OSHA penalized Kern Oil and refining Company with 11 citations totaling \$83,185 following the January 19, 2005 explosion which caused one death and two injuries. Of the 11 citations, one was general, and the other 10 were serious.

The largest penalty was \$18,000 for a serious violation of Cal/OSHA regulations addressing operating procedures. The investigation alleges that the employer failed to develop or implement temporary operation procedures for removing filter screens and steaming out the crude unit bottom pump. A temporary operating procedure is required to address an explosion hazard such as water condensing inside the flexible steam line and being introduced into the pump containing hot crude oil.

A serious citation is issued when there is substantial probability that death or serious physical harm could result from a condition which exists – or from practices, operations or processes in the workplace.

California law provides that a company may appeal Cal/OSHA citations and penalties within 15 working days to the Cal/OSHA Appeals Board.

## **EPA upholds reformulated gas requirement**

EPA recently announced it will reject petitions made by California, New York, and Connecticut to waive the oxygen content requirement for reformulated gasoline (RFG).

RFG is a cleaner –burning gasoline required by the Clean Air Act to be used in certain metropolitan areas of the United States with the worst ozone pollution. It has been used since 1995 and continues to be a strategy to reduce emissions from motor vehicles that cause ozone. RFG also reduces emissions of harmful toxics, such as Benzene.

The Clean Air Act requires RFG to contain two percent oxygen by weight. The law does not specify which oxygenate must be used and most refiners use either ethanol or Methyl Tertiary Butyl Ether (MTBE). RFG sold in California, New York, and Connecticut contains only ethanol, since each of these states has banned MTBE use due to water pollution concerns.

This action follows a detailed review of the submissions made by each state in support of the petition. This is EPA's second response to California, which sued EPA after the agency denied the state's original petition in 2001. This latest decision was made after EPA conducted additional analysis to address the 9<sup>th</sup> Circuit Court's decision to vacate the agency's original denial.

EPA's denial of California's petition is based on the agency's conclusion that California has not demonstrated that the oxygen content requirement prevents or interferes with the state's efforts to achieve clean air.
