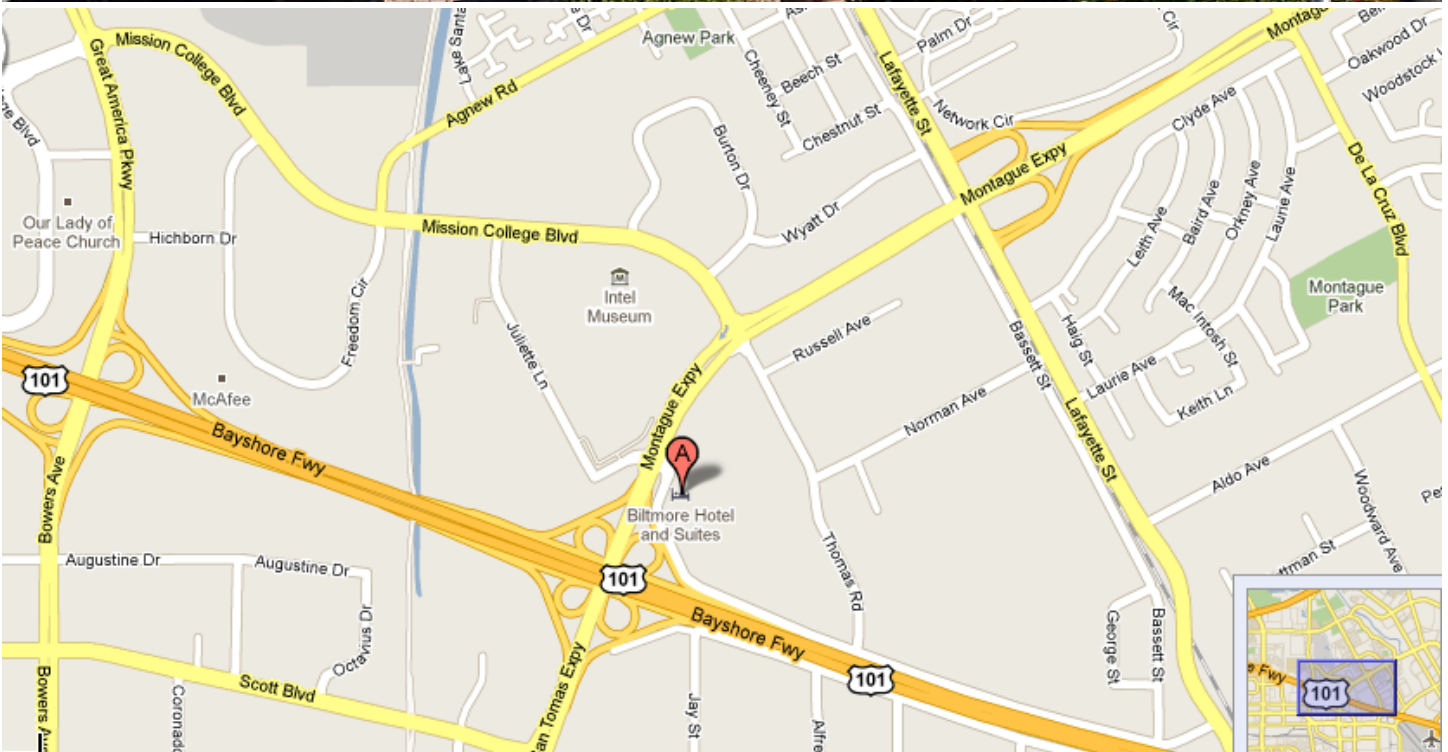

COLD MEDICATION & DROWSINESS

Cold and flu season is here again. Now is a good time for our annual warning about using over-the-counter cold and flu medications during work hours. Sometimes, cold remedies and work are not a good mix.

The most common side effect of over-the-counter cold and flu medicine is drowsiness, which lowers one's alertness and reaction time. Ten to twenty-five percent of people taking these medications report daytime drowsiness. This can be more than just an annoyance. Approximately 200,000 vehicle accidents are attributed to sleepiness every year. Fatigue is a factor in nearly one-third of truck accidents where the driver is killed. Taking medications, then coming to work and using machinery or sharp tools, can be dangerous. So, when you are ill, what should you do?

In many cases, your employer may not want you to show up for work when you have a bad cold or the flu. Not only does your risk of injury increase if medication causes you to be drowsy, but your productivity is likely to be poor as well. In addition, you may pass a virus to co-workers so that they too become ill. Finally, your own recovery may be delayed if you are not getting enough rest to fight the ailment. But, sometimes you *must* come to work and you *need* to take medications. If this is the case, remember the following:

Let your supervisor know. --It may be possible to change your work assignments or temporarily arrange for less hazardous work. You probably shouldn't do tasks that require the use of a respirator, or that are highly demanding, physically. Another reason for speaking to your supervisor is to acknowledge that your performance may not be quite up to par for a few days. Also, should you be injured, your supervisor and emergency responders will need to know what medications you are taking if you are unable to recall.

Follow the recommended dosages.-- Exceeding the recommended dose will not help you get well faster or feel any better. In fact, what usually happens is that side effects, such as drowsiness, become more pronounced.

Do not mix medications.-- Remember, these pills, capsules, or tonics are chemicals. They may be incompatible when mixed, causing more harm than good. A mixture of medicines, or medicine mixed with alcohol, may intensify a side effect or even be dangerous.

Read the label.-- This is where you will find the information you need about dosage and side effects. If you can't read or don't fully understand the label, ask or phone the pharmacist.

Don't try new remedies during work hours.-- If you feel like experimenting with something new or different, do it over the weekend. Everyone reacts differently to cold and flu medication. Find one that works best and gives you the least troublesome side effects, and stay with it.

Wash your hands often.-- We give this advice to kids, but *everyone* should remember it during cold and flu season. More cold viruses are transmitted from hand to hand, from doorknob to hand, from hand to mouth...than in any other way. The best cold and flu solution is prevention

Top 10 Citations: OSHA releases FY 2011 data November 2, 2011

OSHA has published data on its most frequently cited standards, as well as penalty amounts for fiscal year 2011 (October 2010 through September 2011). The results show that the 'Top 10' most frequently cited standards make up almost 44 percent of the citations issued with fall protection in construction and hazard communication in general industry leading the way.

- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- Pay for purchases with a check or credit card when possible.
- Keep cash in your front pocket.
- Notify the credit card issuer immediately if your credit card is lost, stolen or misused.
- Keep a record of all of your credit card numbers in a safe place at home.
- Be extra careful if you do carry a wallet or purse. They are the prime targets of criminals in crowded shopping areas, transportation terminals, bus stops, on buses and other rapid transit.
- Avoid overloading yourself with packages. It is important to have clear visibility and freedom of motion to avoid mishaps.
- Beware of strangers approaching you for any reason. At this time of year, "con-artists" may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or belongings.

Now is a Good Time to be in EHS, Demand High for Safety Professionals

A NIOSH-commissioned survey has found that employers plan to hire 25,000 EHS professionals over the next 5 years, but only 12,000 students are expected to graduate from academic programs related to occupational safety and health. Some of the positions are expected to be filled by employees who don't have EHS training.

However, said NIOSH Director Dr. John Howard, the national demand for occupational safety and health services will significantly outstrip the number of men and women with the training, education and experience necessary to provide such services.

"Robust businesses are essential for U.S. economic recovery and growth, and in turn, safe and healthy workplaces are a vital ingredient of any successful business plan," said Howard. "The results of this NIOSH-commissioned survey suggest a troubling shortfall of professional expertise at a time when such services are most needed."

Howard said NIOSH will continue to work with partners and stakeholders to identify and pursue ways to meet the critical need for training. "The need for an adequate supply of trained professionals is particularly great as we anticipate that growing numbers of older professionals will retire over the next decade, and as new technologies continue to enter the workplace, requiring specialized skills and knowledge," Howard added.

NIOSH commissioned the survey in 2008 as part of a continuing effort with stakeholders to assess national needs for professional occupational safety and health services. An independent research firm, Westsat, designed and conducted the survey. Input to the process was provided by an advisory task force of professionals from diverse disciplines, by major stakeholders and by public comment. The survey found that:

- Degree programs in occupational safety and health have experienced declines in funding from university, college and department sources, especially among programs not provided with funding through NIOSH.
- Obstacles confronted by students who might wish to pursue an occupational safety and health degree include inadequate or limited financial aid, and lack of knowledge about these degree programs.
- While employers generally are satisfied with occupational safety and health professionals' level of training in their specific work areas, they also would like new graduates to have training in additional relevant areas, including leadership and communication.
